Notes from November's Meeting

Voting for 2019 officers took place. Johnny Mills will be the new three-year director. Thank you for being willing to help your local beekeeping group, Johnny. Thank you, Randy Stinson, for your three years as a director. All other 2018 officers were re-elected for 2019.

Ira talked about the State Fair planning meeting, and club goals for improved showing next October.

Ira, Zivon, and Sheyenne will meet with an accountant soon, and start the process of getting nonprofit status for our club. There was discussion of the advantages of being nonprofit. One advantage is we will be eligible for reduced entry fees for events. Another is we will have the ability to receive funds such as donations, grants, and State Fair premiums. Randy asked about the club bank balance. Zivon said it's around \$3,600. Zivon also said we have a new mailing address: P. O. Box 215 | Elon, NC | 27244.

Mike paid the fee for ACB to be in the Burlington Christmas Parade on November 17th. Thank you, Mike! He asked interested paraders to meet him behind Company Shops @ 8:00 to get lined up. Parade starts at 10:00. Nancy Montgomery agreed to wear the bee suit.

Three beekeepers talked to us about beekeeping lessons learned to date. Thank you, all three!

Alex McCollum, of the Class of 2015, was our first speaker. He has learned a lot about beekeeping in his three years: You HAVE to treat for mites. Don't get attached. Don't grow outside your means. Make a plan for yourself and your bees and know it. You don't have to check every frame every time you do a hive check. Everybody has an opinion about how to keep bees. Set bait hives within 50 feed of pond in order to attract swarms. Train bees to a controlled water source early to keep them out of the neighbors' swimming pool. His effort to create two colonies out of a package and an extra queen worked!

Chip McFalls and his girlfriend Theresa Faulkner started keeping bees two years ago. They wanted to raise Russian bees because of their reputation for being mite resistant. Their experience is that mites are still a problem, and so is cold weather!

Tom Cowan, from class of 2018, has been a diligent student of beekeeping this year, but is still nervous about going into the winter. He learned that it is good to check on bees more often than he did during high season. Will be combining his weak colonies before winter.

Mike reports that the sourwood honey crop was about 10 percent of what he gets in a good year. Also said that not much nectar was gotten from tulip poplar this year.

Ira, Zivon, Sheyenne, and Caitlin took the journeyman testing held in October. Ira passed the exams, while Zivon, Sheyenne, and Caitlin *almost* did! Wally Swaim encouraged people to pursue advanced learning and testing. He was very positive about the NC journeyman and master beekeeper programs.

Ira brought a fine thank-you cake in acknowledgement of all the good work done by the State Fair contributors. And Randy Stinson brought a *dee-licious* homemade pound cake. We all enjoyed the sweet end to our season's programs.



This Month in the Bee Yard

- Combine hives that are weak/have failing queens.
- * Feed thick syrup if needed (i.e., if no more than one super of honey stored up).
- Consider insulating smaller hives (those with 4 or fewer frames of bees).
- Year-end review/assessment of apiary success/ challenges.
- * Leave bees alone, if possible.
