Vaccine for Honeybees Could Be a Tool to Fight Population Decline, Julia Jacobs, New York Times, 12/23/2018. The vaccine would be provided to the queen through a sugar solution, and then her offspring would have immunity to the targeted microbial infections. Vaccine is still in development.

SHB – Why do bees lock 'em up?, Vita Bee Health, 1/7/2019. Some worker bees will actually *feed* the SHBs that have been isolated into a propolis "jail." How to the beetles convince them to do that!?

Colony Size, Rather Than Geographic Origin of Stocks, Predicts Overwintering Success in Honey Bees (Hymenoptera: Apidae) in the Northeastern United States, Mehmet Ali Döke et al, Journal of Economic Entomology, 12/19/2018. "We found that stock or region of origin was not correlated with weight, population size, or overwintering success. However, overwintering success was influenced by the weight and population size the colonies reached prior to winter where higher colony weight is a strong predictor of overwintering survival."

Honey bees, already at risk, face a new threat from a common herbicide, Sue Nicolson, Phys.org, 11/29/2018. A new study shows glyphosate has an effect on the gut microbiome of honey bees. "The researchers also found that glyphosate exposure increased the mortality of honey bees that were exposed to a pathogen. Quality, craftsmanship and appearance of
beeswax products.

This Month in the Bee Yard

- Add pollen supplements, if needed; check amount and location of honey stores, and feed (2:1 syrup or fondant) if <3/4 super of stored honey left.
- Check/repair/replace stored equipment; order wax/woodenware.
- Order nucs/packages.
- Keep learning---bee school, read books, journals, etc.
- Combine or insulate smaller (less than 4 frames of bees) hives.
- Combine hives where queen has failed, if they're still alive and haven't absconded.
- Move hives if they'll need to be relocated this year.
- Bees may need help removing dead bodies from entrance area.
